Steel City Strings has showcased another year of remarkable artistic achievements, community engagement, and musical excellence. The past year has been one of growth and innovation for Steel City Strings. Our first concert of the year in 2022 "Earth Connections" was a remarkable and culturally enriching experience that showcased the diversity of Australian and German composers. The program was thoughtfully curated, featuring renowned Australian composers Peter Sculthorpe, Paul Stanhope, Stuart Greenbaum, and German-British composer Max Richter. One of the highlights of the evening was the inclusion of Indigenous performer and composer William Barton, who mesmerized the audience with his captivating works such as Didge Fusion, Petrichor, and Birdsong at Dusk. Additionally, we proudly commissioned and performed an arrangement of works by Indigenous composer Brenda Gifford, further highlighting the rich heritage of Australian music. Collaborating with local Indigenous communities made this concert a profound learning experience for the orchestra, fostering a deeper understanding and appreciation of Indigenous culture and music. The dedication and effort put into this concert paid off, as it was recognised as one of Steel City Strings' most powerful and memorable performances to date.

Our second concert titled "Seasons" was a breathtaking display of musical artistry and collaboration. The highlight of the evening was the sensational performance by celebrated violinist Emily Sun, whose virtuosity mesmerized the audience as she flawlessly rendered Max Richter's stunning composition, "Vivaldi Reimagined". It was a transformative experience for the orchestra, as they had the privilege of working alongside such a well-versed and supportive soloist, gaining invaluable insights and honing their craft. The concert further showcased the brilliance of Australian composer Graham Koehne, whose works added a touch of contemporary flair to the program. The Concerto

Grosso by Vivaldi, a timeless masterpiece, brought a sense of classical grandeur to the performance. Under the baton of Elizabeth Scott, the concert was brought to life with meticulous attention to detail and a nurturing approach during rehearsals and performances. The collaboration between Emily Sun, the orchestra, and conductor Elizabeth Scott created an unforgettable musical experience that resonated with audiences

The "Women in Steel" concert series brought forth a powerful and captivating program that celebrated the cultural history of women in the Illawarra Steel Industry. Steel City Strings embarked on an ambitious project by commissioning a percussion concerto by composer Natalie Williams, aimed at capturing and sharing the stories of the remarkable women who worked in the steel industry. The extraordinary percussionist Claire Edwardes took center stage, dazzling audiences with her mastery of a wide range of percussion instruments, breathing life into the concerto and bringing forth the voices of these resilient women. The concert also featured works by Eastern-European composers Dragan Supalevski, Aleksandra Vrebalov, Pavle Popović, and the renowned Russian composer Dmitri Shostakovich. Each composition added its unique flavor to the program, showcasing the depth and diversity of music from these regions. 'Women in Steel' was a poignant and evocative concert experience that shed light on the strength and contributions of women in the steel industry, leaving a lasting impact on both the performers and the audience.

We would like to extend our heartfelt gratitude to the individuals and organisations who have played a vital role in the success and growth of Steel City Strings. It was good to see the back of Covid-19 restrictions in 2022 so Steel City Strings could get on with delivering three concerts this year. All three concerts, planned for earlier years, had received individual project grants to subsidise performances. CreateNSW also provided an operational grant of \$60,000 which helps fund increased administration support.

Due to 2022 being a post-pandemic recovery year Steel City ticket sales increased from \$19,588 the prior year to \$58,990 from the 8 separate performances held.

Donations for the year were also higher than in previous years. The grant for the performance of "Women in Steel" was a matching grant of \$15,000 from Creative Partnerships Australia that required Steel City Strings to raise a similar amount. Business Development Manager Anne Hinchliffe led a donations campaign successfully raising over \$17,000 from Steel City Strings' supporters.

Staff changes in the year had both positive and negative impacts on the financial position. A Business Development manager was recruited early in 2022 to focus on audience development and grant applications.

However, the Operations Manager at the time Jeremy Boulton, who supported the orchestra throughout the pandemic years, resigned to focus on his singing career. A new Operations Manager was recruited in July but has since left the organisation. Staff costs increased and this increase was offset by the CreateNSW grant noted above.

Total Assets grew from \$103,725 in 2021 to \$113,822 in 2022. Recognition of deferred grant income as revenue has led to a decrease in liabilities of \$49407. Due to the items listed above Net Equity grew to \$104,132 by the end of 2022 calendar year.

2023 has some challenges ahead with a new Operations Manager to be recruited as well as potentially new Directors to increase the skill level across the board.

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PROGRAMS

2022 has been a catch-up year in which we presented programs cancelled over 2020 and 2021 due to COVID lockdowns. This proved a challenging logistical exercise, as our soloists were also returning and rapidly filling their schedules with catch-up national and international bookings.

Our first performance "Earth Connections" in May featured didgeridoo artist William Barton performing his own compositions in a program of mainly Australian compositions. The theme was our connection with the natural environment, including birds, clouds, sea, sky, footprints and the earth itself, accompanied by images provided by Four Donkey Films.

"Seasons" in August featured violinist Emily Sun in Max Richter's reimagining of Antonio Vivaldi's "Four Seasons". It was also an opportunity for three orchestra members (Kyle Little, Jacob Antonio and Matthew Tsalidis) to showcase their own talents in two concertos by Vivaldi.

In November "Women in Steel" premiered a new work, "Steeling Fire", commissioned by Steel City Strings, by Australian composer Natalie Williams, and featuring guest soloist percussionist Claire Edwardes. "Women in Steel" honours the tenacity of women in the Illawarra who changed Australia's industrial laws in the1980s/90s, celebrated in the Illawarra filmmaker, Robynne Murphy's award-winning documentary, "Women of Steel".



PEOPLE

Steel City Strings won Create NSW annual funding for 2022, enabling us to employ contractors for business development to attract further funding and operations management to improve internal and external communications systems.

Jeremy Boulton, who so effectively kept Steel City Strings audiences engaged through the COVID years with digital offerings, left us in April to pursue his own career as an operatic baritone in Europe. He ensured that our 2022 season was successfully launched before departing for which we are grateful.

Ann Hinchliffe joined us in April as Business Development Manager. Ann was extremely effective in attracting funding from Create NSW for future projects, conducted a highly effective fundraiser through the Australian Cultural Fund platform with support of Creative Partnerships Australia Plus 1 grants program, and secured annual funding for Steel City Strings for 2023, as well as a number of smaller grants. Ann left Steel City Strings in October for family reasons but remains connected for casual contract work.

An Operations Manager Josh Reid was employed in July to improve internal and external communication systems.

Thanks to our audience members and subscribers who stayed with us during COVID for our digital offerings and returned to our concert halls in force in 2022 for a successful season.


